Lodge News

During the January Social Hour members enjoyed hearty soups, salads and Finnish style open face sandwiches for lunch. We listened to Terry Arnall's presentation on the Swedish artist Carl Larson and admired examples of his art. **The following 2017 Officers were installed:**

Auditors: Cindy Daly, Stan Hendrickson and Greta Passetti

Communications: The Secretary reported e-mail communications with the Finnish Metsalehti group. They have accepted the date of September 20th for their visit to the Lodge. Dr. Greg Jacob will present a lecture on the Finnish epic, Kalevala, in March.

Sick Members and Sunshine: Cards will be sent to Sue Guderjohn whose husband is ill, and to Charolette and Willie Nyberg, Charolette's mother is ill and is in the hospital

Trustees report: Willie Nyberg reported for the Trustees: The group Save our Wild Salmon has rented the Hall for their meeting on January 9th. They estimate 30 - 40 members to be present at the meeting. Discussion on the possible installation of the chair climber continues, and no decision has been made. Further cost estimates are sought by the contractor.

Scandinavian Midsummer festival: Correction to last month's minutes: Senior Miss Finland 2017 is not Aimee Schacher, but her sister Megan Schacher. Aimee was Sr. Miss Finland in 2013. 2017 will be the 50th Anniversary of the Astoria Scandinavian Midsummer Festival. Several performing groups have already been contacted. Carole Lyngstad reported that the Scandinavian Monument Committee has made an agreement with the City on the maintenance issues. City Council will discuss the Monument at its February meeting. When the plan is approved, donation solicitations will start and an architect will be hired.

Auxiliary news: David Drafall read the January 2 minutes of the Auxiliary. Laksloda will be in October. The auxiliary needs another serving cart. Several possible functions were discussed: Bruce Connor has been consulted about possibly using the Hall for cooking classes to cruise ship passengers. Presentations of Scandinavian culture and Finnish language were also considered. Suggestions were made about opening the Lodge to Bingo and craft meets. It was decided to serve corn chowder and pea soup at the January Lodge meeting The February meeting will be at the Golden Star Restaurant

Reading of Trustee Minutes: Carole Lyngstad wondered why the Trustee minutes are not read at the Membership meetings, just as the Auxiliary minutes are. Members pointed out that a report is read at each meeting immediately after the Trustees meeting of the same day, and also published as part of the Lodge News in Kahden Uutiset. Further discussion on the issue was tabled until the next Lodge meeting, which hopefully would have a larger member attendance.

During the February meeting Social Hour members heard a presentation by Bruce Connor of Sundial Travel. He had been invited by members of the Auxiliary to talk about feasibility of arranging cooking classes or demonstrations during some Cruise Ship stops in Astoria during the 2018 season.

Membership applications: An application was received from Julie Leonhardt Overby. Her membership was proposed by Viola Leonhardt, Bernie Bjork and Leroy Adolphson. Her application was approved.

Initiations: Tim and Karen Malinen were initiated and welcomed to the Lodge by members present.

Communications: The Secretary read several communications:

In a note, Mary Cornell informed us about the death of Eric Lappi and apologized for not having his obituary available at this time and asked for the postponement of Draping of the Charter until the next meeting.

In a note Margaret Johnson thanked the Lodge for her 25-year pin, which means a lot to her.

The Secretary read an e-mail message about Dr. Greg Jacob's Kalevala Lecture, scheduled for March 25th. The Portland lecture on the topic was held on February 10th and it received rave reviews from about 80 people in attendance. Two separate messages from the Astoria Scandinavian Heritage Foundation were read, one from the President asking for

our Lodge to continue sponsoring the events, and another describing the levels of support requested.

Sick Members and Sunshine: Another card will be sent to Sue Guderjohn whose husband has been hospitalized after an amputation of his leg because of severe infection. We wish him and Sue well.

Newsletter Kahden Uutiset: Editor of the KU, Elizabeth Newton, has resigned. We need a new Editor as soon as possible. The next newsletter is due at the end of this month.

Audit was held today, February 12th.

Lodge Picnic: Lodge picnic will be held on August 13th at the Cullaby Lake picnic area. Parking is available next to the picnic site. There is a parking fee at the County Park.

Trustees report: Willie Nyberg reported for the Trustees: The date of the Kalevala lecture by Dr. Greg Jacob has been set for Saturday evening on March 25th. The Lecture will be open to the public and will be advertised.

The Finnish Metsälehti group visit will be on September 20th. Trustees will contact the group to ask about the number of Finnish guests. Light Dinner will be served. All members are welcome.

Trustees discussed tuning of the two pianos. The consensus was that they are not part of the building structure and thus, should be the responsibility of the Lodge and not Trustees.

Willie Nyberg listed items of repairs discussed during the walkthrough by Lodge officers with contractor Lee Burnard:

- A corroding gas pipe leading to the building from the gas meters needs to be replaced as soon as possible.

— Deteriorating posts and beams supporting the building structure need replacements in the basement to stabilize the building that is sagging, cost estimate \$5,750

- Replacing the kitchen water heater with an on-demand unit, cost estimate \$2,819
- New dining area carpet and elimination of the ramp to the kitchen, cost estimate \$7,005
- Bathroom heaters and floor tiles, no cost estimate yet available.
- The front door needs to be repaired or replaced to secure the entrance to the building and to change the door to one that qualifies as a fire exit, cost estimate \$2,050.

Trustees will continue to prioritize the needed work on the building according to funds available.

Scandinavian Midsummer Festival: Members voted to sponsor the 2017 Astoria Scandinavian Midsummer Festival with a gift of \$250. No further news on the Scandinavian Monument.

New Committees: President Trudy Enke discussed the need for committees to take care of various tasks. Suggested committees are: Grand Lodge Officers Committee, Historical Committee, with Arnie Hummasti in charge; Cultural Committee with Kurt Koivu and Marvin Hautala; Dance Committee with Katherine Hendrickson.

Kurt Koivu had studied the history of the Lodge and its many activities. The lodge used to have an Athletic Club. He suggested that we start activities such as sports, exercise, walk and talk, step aerobics etc. Members approved these types of plans.

Next Lodge meeting: The next regular meeting will be on Sunday, March 12^{th,} with social hour at 1 PM and business meeting at 2:00 PM. Note that Daylight Savings Time starts on March 12th. St. Urho's Day potluck dinner will be served.




Image of original Kalevala graphics by Akseli Gallen-Kallela

Great Adventure at Small Places

7 May 1957

Kevin, Emile, Guiseppe, Helmut, and myself attended the last Cub Scout meeting before the Summer break. We had completed the knife safety course. Each of us received the official legal size blue Cub Scout pocketknife. It had a 2 7/8 inch polished silver blade with blue plastic handle and gold baby karhu (Finnish for bear).

We had passed around some J. F. Cooper novels during the year and we were ready for some Natty Bumpo adventures. Living in a metro area precluded a true wilderness experience so we had to be satisfied with a trip to the forest preserve next to the tree museum.

We packed our bicycles with canteens of water, peanut butter sandwiches, and our trusty blue knives. As we rode away Daniella, a Belgian girl, ran out in front of us and demanded to know where we were going! She

was our age, a Brownie, but had no knife so she didn't count. We let her come along. We said she could do the cooking and laundry.

We arrived at the woods, took off our packs and ate what food we had and were ready for whatever dangers lay ahead. Daniella had read an article about wild foods written by Euell Gibbons of "Tastes like wild hickory nuts" fame. She also had a book about wildflowers. After she had called out the names of fifty some species we all chorused "who cares!" Acting under peer pressure I joined in the deriding. Secretly I was actually quite interested in the designs of nature and especially the colors.

We climbed over a small sand ridge near Powderhorn Lake and found a cattail marsh that seemed to go on forever. The cattails were well over our heads so it was eerie walking through them. After an hour we came to a water covered clearing filled with hundreds of fleeing ducks..

Daniella resumed her dissertation on flora and fauna and she mentioned that the Indians once used the cattails for food. Our starving brains jumped to attention. Kevin and Helmut frantically began cutting the cattails with their new knives. Someone said they should taste like boiled potatoes. Soon we had a pot of boiling brown and green gook. Daniella said I think that is enough and we each took a spoonful of the concoction and swallowed. A silence fell over the group. Nobody heaved but no one was smiling.

Our lives were about to change. Later that year Sputnik could be seen orbiting the sky and the cattail marsh seemed less remote. We would continue to visit that special place over the years. I came to appreciate the vast number of life forms sustained by this fragile and complex creation.
