We must remind members that attendance at meetings is important so that proper input by all is heard in many matters critical to the Lodge's successful operation.

President Trudy Enke called the business meeting to order at 2:00 PM.

Communications: The Lodge received a letter from the Winlock Lodge inviting members to their lodge's 109th Anniversary celebration on March 12th. The Secretary read her reply of congratulations to the Winlock Lodge. **Sick Members and Sunshine:** Card will be sent to Greg Jacob whose wife is ill, and to Nancy Ceasar, whose mother passed away. We wish them both well.

Trustees report: Willie Nyberg reported for the Trustees:

Basement work and the corroding outdoor gas line replacement are first on the priority list of work to be done. Other renovation will be scheduled when funds are available for major restoration inside the building dining area, bathrooms and the kitchen.

Committee Reports:

Newsletter Kahden Uutiset: Sherry Bjork has agreed to become the new Editor of the Kahden Uutiset. This will be a free service to the Lodge. Sherry does not want to be paid, but would like her honorarium to be considered an in-kind donation to the Lodge's Building Fund. Thank you, Sherry!

Scandinavian Midsummer Festival: Charolette Nyberg is the Chairman of the Princess Committee. The Festival is now holding fundraising events in support of the Summer Festival. The Canadian ABBA group has been confirmed among entertainers.

Auxiliary: March meeting minutes were taken by Peggy Nikkila and read by Charolette Nyberg. Plans for Scandinavian Festival Rice Pudding Booth were discussed. More helpers are needed to work in the kitchen and at the booth. **Annual Picnic** will be held at the Cullaby Lake County Park on August 13th. It was decided to serve chicken.

Unfinished Business:

President Trudy Enke asked members to take responsibilities as leaders in various areas of Lodge activity. She will be calling people to ask them to step in.

Kurt Koivu and Lis Stubberfield will be in charge of decorating.

Dance advertisement: Because of the large event at the Liberty Theater that conflicts with the time of the Dance, it was decided not to put an ad in the paper about the dance. Matt Crichton will announce the Dance on Facebook.

May Membership meeting: Strawberry Shortcake will be served with whipped cream. Men will be in charge, among them Marvin, Leroy and our new member Lanny. The Scandinavian Court will visit the Lodge. It was decided to give each Court member a Koski Box again. Members voted to approve the cost of the boxes.

Dance on March 19th: The cost of the DJ is \$200, that amount has been donated by members, cost of food will be about \$50, and was approved.

Finnish Metsälehti Group visit: The group will visit Suomi Hall on Wednesday September 20th for a light dinner event during their West Coast trip. The group will be 35 visitors. Local forestry specialists will be invited to attend. The Steering Committee will meet on April 20th at noon to make plans.

New Business:

Finland's 100th year Anniversary of Independence: A suggestion was made to develop a presentation, including those members who were living in Finland during her independent years.

Transfer of funds to Trustees account: To cover the expenses of the emergency building improvements, Trustees requested a transfer of funds to their account for the basement beam and post replacement to support the structure, and towards the replacement of the gas line from the meter to the building. Transfer does not need to occur until the funds are needed. Motion carried with one vote opposing the motion.

During the April Social Hour members enjoyed coffee and desserts brought in by members. A Finnish Family from Vaasa stopped by to visit the Hall. They saw the Suomi Hall sign and the flags outside and came up to say hello. Music was waltz and polka, and some dancers practiced the steps with Katherine Hendrickson.

President Trudy Enke called the business meeting to order at 7:05 PM.

Communications: The Secretary mentioned her e-mail communications with Dr. Greg Jacob on the subject of his Kalevala lecture. The date and time of the lecture is now scheduled for April 15 at 7 PM. Advertising has been arranged with the Daily Astorian's Coast Weekend edition. The Chamber of Commerce has been sent a notice of the event for their website. And KMUN and other radio stations have been notified. Updated Lecture flyers were printed and distributed. **Draping of the Charter:** The Charter was draped in remembrance of Eric Lappi who passed away on January 22, 2017 at age 58. He was a member of the Astoria Lodge since May 2002. Members observed a moment of silence in his memory. **Sick Members and Sunshine:** A card with a message of condolence was sent to Greg Jacob whose wife passed away. **Trustees report:** Willie Nyberg reported for the Trustees:

The elevator was fixed at a cost of \$660.65. To be prepared in case of future elevator problems, Trustees will be trained to help in emergencies so that those trapped can be lowered down quickly. The corroded gas line going into the building from the gas meter will be repaired, Bernie Bjork has checked it, the outside needs to be refinished, and he can do it. Our contractor Lee Burnard will start with the basement reinforcements and posts later this week.

The future restoration of the west wall of the building was discussed. It will be a major job and can be done in three stages. The cost will be high, the current estimate is about \$100,000.

The Kalevala Lecture has been rescheduled for April 15th at 7 PM. April 15th garage sale has been canceled for this year. A decision is needed on the fate of the Svensen cemetery. The Lodge owns it and needs to decide what to do with it. The Trustees have decided to first get the land surveyed. More information will be gathered and brought to the membership. The cemetery liability insurance costs about \$1,000 per year.

Committee Reports:

Scholarship Committee: Leila Collier is still in charge. Karen Reintzell is a new member.

Auxiliary: March meeting minutes were taken by Peggy Nikkila. Plans for Scandinavian Festival Rice Pudding Booth were discussed. More helpers are needed to work in the kitchen and at the booth. Plans to hold cooking classes at the Hall have been discussed.

Unfinished Business:

Report on the Suomi Hall Dance on March 19th: Katherine Hendrickson told us that the visiting group of 13 dancers from Longview liked the room and the floor very much. They would like to come back here again. It was suggested that we hold another dance on the third Sunday in July.

May Membership Meeting: Strawberry Shortcake will be served with whipped cream. Men will be in charge, among them Marvin, Leroy and our new member Lanny. The 2017 Scandinavian Court will visit the Lodge.

Walking and other Finn-Fit projects: Kurt Koivu is heading a group of members who want to walk and exercise together. If the project is successful, he will get blue shirts made for the group.

New Business:

Movie nights: Kurt Koivu will present Finnish movies in recognition of the centennial of Finnish independence. These will be on a big screen TV. His suggestion was Friday nights with a game of kubb outside and then a movie at Suomi Hall. The first one will be done on Monday May 1 at 6:45 PM.

For the good of the Order:

President Trudy Enke reminded everyone about the Kalevala Lecture. This is a very special event. Everyone is encouraged to attend the lecture.

Trustee Bernie Bjork brought up the need to restore the west wall of the building within the next few years. We will get three bids and have an architect and an engineer involved. This will be a big, costly project. Members need to start thinking about it.

Although Kaisa Saari of Naselle was not a Lodge member, her passing was announced to members. Kaisa and Wilho Saari have been prominent Finns in our area for many years. A card will be sent to Kaisa's husband, Wilho Saari.



About 650 cackler geese rose up and circled to avoid an eagle cruising past searching for cripples. We spotted the following species.


